Despite the huge impact that COVID had on all charities in 2020, I am pleased to say that Variety Ireland continued on an upward trajectory, with 2020/2021 proving to be a very exciting time for our charity!

During the year, we were able to continue our educational support for children and thanks to some wonderful corporate partners, even more children than ever benefitted from our iPads for Schools campaign. We are so grateful to all those who got involved with this campaign, and thanks to them, learning in both schools and at home became a little bit easier for thousands of children.

Throughout the year we continued to help fund countless specialised mobility trikes, and then in July 2021 we launched our Recycle Mobility programme, which will ensure that all these trikes will now be upcycled once a child grows out of it. At the helm of this new campaign was inspirational 9 year old Saoírse Ruane, who we announced as the first ever child Ambassador for Variety Ireland!

Our iPads for Schools and Recycle Mobility programmes both follow the ethos of our Sustainability Policy, that we launched in September 2020. Under the remit of this policy, we endeavour to do all we can to carry out our work in the most environmentally sustainable way possible. By using upcycled devices in our iPads for Schools campaign and ensuring our Recycle Mobility trikes are later upcycled and reused, we are doing what we can to make the future in which our children live that bit brighter.

We also continued our partnership with the Miss Ireland team, and I would like to thank each and every one of the contestants for their incredible fundraising work throughout the year. Some even gave up their free time to show support for our National Makeup Free Day, as well as treating some very special children to their very own "Fantasy Ireland" fancy dress tea parties.

Our charity has continued to go from strength to strength and I believe that 2022 will be even brighter for us and we look forward to helping even more children throughout the island of Ireland in the future!

Educational Support with iPads

Throughout the year we continued our educational support programme, by supplying upcycled iPads to help to children all across Ireland. Lockdown has had a detrimental effect on so many children's education, especially children who require additional support and help with learning. iPads were the ideal solution to many families homeschooling woes and Variety Ireland were more than happy to help whereever possible!

We were able to help many children such as Isobel, whose mum told us "Isobel uses the iPad as a communication device, as she is pre-verbal and it is also assisting us with home-schooling."



iPads for Schools Project

Variety Ireland recognise the essential duties that every Special Needs Assistant carries out on a daily basis, in helping children with learning difficulties.

By providing an upcycled iPad to every National School, we hope that we can help in some small way to make learning more accessible to some, as well as being more environmentally conscious.

In Spring 2021, we were able to supply an iPad to every National School in two counties. Thanks to Sean Mulryan and Ballymore properties, 95 schools in Co. Roscommon received an iPad, whilst 155 National Schools in Co. Mayo also received iPads thanks to businessman Tim O'Leary.





Providing Specialised Trikes

During the year, we were able to provide many children up and down the country with specialised trikes. These trikes can have such a positive impact on children of all ages. They are not only a fun way to get around, but can also offer many other vital physical and mental benefits too!

These trikes have proved to be so beneficial to children, who due to various disabilities, cannot cycle a regular bicycle.

The child can also experience a new found independence and sense of inclusion. They can now join in with their friends and family in many adventures and activities the great outdoors, which previously may have been unimaginable!



Funding Specialised Car Seats

Variety - the Children's Charity of Ireland like nothing more than to help a child and their family by providing something that others may take for granted.

Something as simply as a car seat, may seem like a everyday item, but when your child requires a specialised car seat, that can been a very costly requirement and one that is not provided by any government funding.

For someone like 6 year old Lucy, a new car seat meant she could now not only go on essential car journeys, but also have fun days out with her family – all whilst knowing that she was safe and secure!



National Makeup Free Challenge

In November 2020, Variety Ireland launched their first ever National Makeup Free Challenge on Ireland:AM on Virgin Media One.

The National Makeup Free Challenge is a nationwide initiative designed to help raise self-awareness and promote "Inner beauty" to people across Ireland in aid of Variety – the Children's Charity of Ireland.

It encourages both men and women to go "makeup free", whilst also challenging a friend to do the same in helping to raise funds which will go to providing special mobility and educational equipment to children who are sick, disadvantaged or have special needs.



Someone to Hold This Christmas Day

Variety Ireland called into Temple Street Children's Hospital just before Christmas, to drop in Irish handmade knitted dolls and blankets.

These were donated by Carlow based arts & crafts store Woollygoods.com as part of Variety Ireland's "Someone to Hold this Christmas Day" campaign.

We hope that by providing these knitted goods, that the many children who had to spend Christmas in Temple Street Hospital , would have someone to " Hold and talk to "whilst lying in their cot or hospital bed on Christmas Day.

In 2021, Variety Ireland were delighted to once again be chosen as the Miss Ireland 'Beauty with a Purpose' charity of choice partner. This means that all the finalists must raise funds and awareness for charities of their choice and Variety Ireland. As part of their Miss Ireland journey, many finalists took some very special children to their very own Fantasy Ireland Tea Party!

The children got to dress up as their favourite movie character and enjoy being treated like a real star for the day. They enjoyed a fun filled tea party in a special venue in their home county. Truly magical!!



Our First Ever Child Ambassador

2021 saw us welcome Saoírse Ruane as the first ever child Ambassador to Variety Ireland. Since being diagnosed with a life threatening tumour and losing her right leg, Saoirse continues to prove and act as an inspiration and a beacon of hope to lots of children and adults, not only here in Ireland but across the world.

Following her first appearance on the Late Late Toy Show in 2020 she inspired the first ever Toy Show Appeal on the Late Late Show. An amazing €6.6m euro was raised in 2020 alone through that appeal for various charities around Ireland!



Recycle Mobility Programme

In July 2021, we launched our Recycle Mobility Programme, which is a unique idea that focuses on promoting access to upcycled specially adapted trikes, for children who cannot use conventional bicycles. Not only does this initiative offer inclusion to children of different abilities, but as the trikes are pre-loved, it is also environmentally friendly!

These trikes have proved to be so beneficial to children, who due to various disabilities, cannot cycle a regular bicycle. Not only do these trikes offer so many physical benefits, but also offer great mental benefits too. The child can experience a new found independence and now also join in with their friends and family in the great outdoors, which previously may have been unimaginable!

As each trike is specially adapted to an individual child's needs, the cost for each trike can be very expensive. These trikes, until now, have not been covered by any government funding, therefore unobtainable for many families of children with special needs.

As these trikes are specially adapted for an each child, they cannot be used by other children, so therefore obsolete once the child outgrows it. With our Recycle Mobility Programme, once a child outgrows their trike, we take it back, upcycle it and then adapt it to another child's particular needs. This way, more children can benefit from these amazing trikes!

The directors present their Directors' Annual Report, combining the Directors' Report and Trustees' Report, and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 30 September 2021.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Directors' Report contains the information required to be provided in the Directors' Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The directors of the charity are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the charity's constitution are known as members of the board of trustees.

In this report the directors of The Heart of Variety (Ireland) Company Limited by Guarantee present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year 2021.

The charity is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102, the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

The charity is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

Financial Review

The results for the financial year are set out on page 10 and additional notes are provided showing income and expenditure in greater detail.

Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the charity has assets of €198,088 (2020 - €127,271) and liabilities of €112,521 (2020 - €11,734). The net assets of the charity have decreased by €(29,970).

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertaintities facing the company is that enough income will not be raised in order for the company to carry out its objectives.

The board is committed to continue to raise funds in order to continue to help children who are sick, disadvantaged or have special needs.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the charity financial statements of The Heart of Variety (Ireland) Company Limited by Guarantee for the financial year ended 30 September 2021 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities (incorporating an Income and Expenditure Account), the Balance Sheet and the notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", applying Section 1A of that Standard and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the charity as at 30 September 2021 and of its deficit for the financial year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", as applied in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act 2014 and having regard to the Charities SORP; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014.

Basis for opinion

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The Heart of Variety (Ireland) Company Limited by Guarantee is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. The registered office of the charity is 3rd Floor Ulysess House, Foley Street, Dublin 1, D01 W2T2 which is also the principal place of business of the charity. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the charity.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

The charity has applied the Charities SORP on a voluntary basis as its application is not a requirement of the current regulations for charities registered in the Republic of Ireland. As permitted by the Companies Act 2014, the charity has varied the standard formats in that act for the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet. Departures from the standard formats, as outlined in the Companies Act 2014, are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with section 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of that SORP.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the charity for the financial year ended 30 September 2021 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102", applying Section 1A of that Standard.

Fund accounting

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the charity.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

Income

Income is recognised by inclusion in the Statement of Financial Activities only when the charity is legally entitled to the income, performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, the amounts involved can be measured with sufficient reliability and it is probable that the income will be received by the charity.

Income from charitable activities

Income from charitable activities include income earned from the supply of services under contractual arrangements and from performance related grants which have conditions that specify the provision of particular services to be provided by the charity. Income from government and other co-funders is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to the income because it is fulfilling the conditions contained in the related funding agreements. Where a grant is received in advance, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, it is accrued in debtors.

Grants from governments and other co-funders typically include one of the following types of conditions:

- Performance based conditions: whereby the charity is contractually entitled to funding only to the extent that the core objectives of the grant agreement are achieved. Where the charity is meeting the core objectives of a grant agreement, it recognises the related expenditure, to the extent that it is reimbursable by the donor, as income.

-Time based conditions: whereby the charity is contractually entitled to funding on the condition that it is utilised in a particular period. In these cases the charity recognises the income to the extent it is utilised within the period specified in the agreement.

In the absence of such conditions, assuming that receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured, grant income is recognised once the charity is notified of entitlement.

Grants received towards capital expenditure are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable, whichever is earlier.

Expenditure

Expenditure is analysed between costs of charitable activities and raising funds. The costs of each activity are separately accumulated and disclosed, and analysed according to their major components. Expenditure is recognised when a legal or constructive obligation exists as a result of a past event, a transfer of economic benefits is required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be reliably measured. Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but cannot be attributed to one activity. Such costs are allocated to activities in proportion to staff time spent or other suitable measure for each activity.

Governance costs

Governance costs are the costs associated with the stewardship arrangements of the charity. They comprise costs arising from the constitutional and obligatory arrangements, as well as the costs associated with the strategic management of the company's activities. Typical costs would be audit and legal fees, direct salary and overhead costs incurred in the strategic as opposed to day to day management of the charity.

Cash and cash equivelants

Cash consists of cash on hand and demand deposits. Cash equivalents consist of short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash that are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Income recognised by the charity from government agencies and other co-funders, but not yet received at financial year end, is included in debtors.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months notice of withdrawal.

Taxation

No current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable exemption. Irrecoverable valued added tax is expensed as incurred.

The company is exempt from corporation tax due to its charitable status in Ireland (Revenue Commissioners Registration No. CHY 5739.)
